

Four of these problems will be graded (our choice, not yours!), with each problem worth 5 points. Clear and complete justification is required for full credit. You are welcome to discuss these problems with anyone and everyone, but must write up your own final submission without reference to any sources other than the textbook and instructor.

1. If $p|a$ and $p|b$ then $p^2|ab$.
2. If $a \equiv_n 1$ and $b \equiv_n 1$, then $a \cdot b \equiv_n 1$.
3. If $a \equiv_n 0$ and $b \equiv_n c$, then $a + b \equiv_n c$.
4. If n, a , and b and c are integers for which $a \equiv_n b$, then $a + c \equiv_n b + c$.

8. The statements $\neg(P \vee Q)$ and $\neg P \wedge \neg Q$ are logically equivalent. [DeMorgan's Law]
9. A statement and its inverse are logically equivalent.
10. A statement and its contrapositive are logically equivalent.
11. The statements $P \wedge (Q \vee R)$ and $(P \wedge Q) \vee R$ are logically equivalent.
12. The statements $P \wedge (Q \vee R)$ and $(P \wedge Q) \vee (P \wedge R)$ are logically equivalent.
